comments: I have sent the council information on face mask earlier. Now I like to broaden the discussion by sending you what is happening in court in Ohio. This comes from a newsletter noted below.

Ohio attorney, Thomas Renz, on behalf of plaintiffs, has filed a case against the state of Ohio and Governor Mike DeWine. Renz is asking for a jury trial.

This case, in the current climate, should provoke intense interest from the public, and from every lawyer within hailing distance.

Here is the impressive opening salvo in the court filing:

"In recent months, entire states have been imprisoned without due process and with the clear threat to impose such lockdowns again, interstate travel has been severely restricted, privacy rights have been devastated, numerous business takings without compensation, and many regulations being implemented without statutory process requirements under the guise of a health emergency that is roughly as dangerous as a seasonal influenza outbreak. The plaintiffs in this case have all been injured in various capacities by these unconstitutional actions, and without action by the Court, will be left without redress. More terrifying, without action by the Court, the Court will be setting future precedent that will allow states to withhold fundamental Constitutional rights, in violation of US Supreme Court precedent, circumventing the various levels of scrutiny applied to such rights, and justify such actions under public health emergency orders without subjecting those orders to any re! al review---just trust the bureaucrats because they are the experts."

Here is the most important point: "We humbly ask the Court in this case to...Recognize that the political process and operative orders are invalid if based on false or misleading information... and recognize the criticality that all future emergency orders be based and maintained on clear, honest facts---particularly when such orders are infringing on Constitutional rights."

In other words, a declared State of Emergency cannot stand on the mere basis of arbitrary edict.

Facts matter. Actual science matters. Reasons why an Emergency is declared matter.

People can't be locked down and restrained from earning a living and having contact with other humans simply because a state authority decides to issue such orders.

If this case goes to trial, the door will open to the presentation of fact and science.

Attorney Renz, for the plaintiffs, is well aware of this, and his filing is studded with bold and accurate claims of fact:

"According to recent data from the Ohio COVID-19 Dashboard, we can see that the 'spike' in cases is actually just a spike in testing. The State went from a few thousand tests per day to 25,000 tests plus per day. The positivity rate for COVID-19 has remained fairly steady but there have been more tests."

"When the Emergency was declared we heard a daily drumbeat about the danger and deaths related to COVID-19.

Now that the case fatality rate has been shown to be roughly the same as the yearly flu...those [death] numbers are simply not scary to the public. As a result, the State sees no impact from talking about fatalities and has instead begun testing more so they could tell us there are more cases."

"The PCR tests are generally viewed as the means of determining if a patient has COVID-19. The problem is that the inventor of the PCR test, who won a Nobel Prize in chemistry for the invention, specifically stated that the test was not well-suited to and never designed to diagnose disease. Much has been made about this in the press and elsewhere but the reason there are issues with PCR testing in relation to COVID is that PCR testing cannot detect how much of a virus exists in a person. Exposure of the existence of incomplete traces of a virus do not mean a person is infected with a disease [,] which is part of the reason the PCR tests have an elevated rate of false positives."

"...there is not even a true standard for testing...Instead we have numerous tests from numerous vendors that may or may not have a similar standard for what it means to 'have' COVID-19. The CDC, governor, and ODH [Ohio Department of Health] know this so they have allowed for the diagnosis of cases based on as meaningless criteria as a cough in a community in which COVID supposedly exists."

Plow through this quote and then receive the translation below: "Another document also came to light that is critical in demonstrating the egregiously misleading nature of the public COVID-19 data. On the final paragraph of page 39 of a document published by the FDA regarding instructions for a COVID-19 test is the following quote: 'Since no quantified virus isolates of the 2019-nCoV are currently available, assays designed for detection of the 2019-nCoV RNA were tested with characterized stocks of in vitro transcribed full length RNA (N gene; GenBank accession: MN908947.2) of known titer (RNA copies/νL) spiked into a diluent consisting of a suspension of human A549 cells and viral transport medium (VTM) to mimic clinical specimen'."

"In plain English this means that there are no available pure 2019-nCOVvirus isolates to test against so instead an educated best guess is being used. The question this leads us to is how accurate can a test be for a virus that has not been defined...? If our freedoms are to be abridged under an emergency declaration related to a disease, should it not be a requirement that the disease at least be defined?"

As you can see, this case is being argued not only on Constitutional grounds, but on major and deep issues of science. The plaintiffs are not accepting "the Word from the experts."

comments: I am a Portsmouth resident. I was trained in public health and worked in the field for more than 30 years. Basic tenets for controlling an epidemic--send the public clear and consistent messages and impede the spread of the contagion. That is why we need our city government to enact a mask mandate. Masks do prevent the virus' spread. And people will take science-based guidance seriously if it is issued in a clear and consistent manner. I'm very disappointed with the dysfunctional gridlock displayed by this Council. If Nashua, Newmarket, Durham and Exeter can enact a face mask mandate why not Portsmouth?

Two events illuminate the impact of the Council's dithering. 1) Valerie Rochon from the Greater Portsmouth Chamber Collaborative was on WSCA Thursday morning. She was very clear: business owners want a city ordinance requiring customers to wear face coverings in their shops. With a law on the books, it will be easier for them to deal with noncompliant people. 2) I read about the couple who refused to wear masks to vote at the Ward 4 polling location even when an outdoor option was offered, a stunt amplified by the bogus claim that the Ward moderator had no authority because there's no law requiring masks at polling locations.

A few comments about Councilor Huda's so-called "fact sheet" in the Council packet for your September 14 Council meeting.

The statistics are not current and are misleading. The points she raises come from a sympathetic engineer and almost all of them have been taken seriously and responded to by the City's Planning Department staff and already addressed in previous documents.

Councilor Huda has wandered into a domain where she has no expertise. For one example, the 85% percentile method which Councilor Huda refers to is antiquated old gold standard for determining what constitutes safe travel speed by vehicles. It is totally inadequate for 21st century planning because it is based solely on the comfort level of drivers. It has nothing to do with the safety needs of pedestrians or cyclists. The method is quickly being replaced here and abroad by the "Vision Zero" method which focuses more on the actual impact of vehicles when they strike vulnerable road users like pedestrians and cyclists at different speeds. The City of Boston, for example, is now using Vision Zero for planning, as are a growing number of US towns and cities.

I'm sorry to have to put this so starkly, but to imply that the bike lanes somehow contributed to the recent "dooring" accident on Middle Street is simply a demonstrable lie.

But most importantly, this Council was sworn in to adhere to and realize existing Council policies regarding the City's multi-modal plans for transportation now and in the future. I have yet to hear any Councilor other than Councilor Tabor refer to the overarching principles and guidance found in our policy documents. Councilor Huda suggests that there's some kind of agenda out there to "trade in vehicles for bikes." Forget agendas and think policy. After years of work, including much public input via forums like Portsmouth Listens, the City now has clear policies. The Council's job is to either enact them or change them, but that doesn't include interfering with individual projects. I sincerely hope the Council defeats this potentially dangerous motion.

comments: I am writing as a citizen of Portsmouth, and I would like to start by commending the City for the efforts it has taken to assist businesses during the COVID-19 epidemic. These are challenging times, and I appreciate that the City government has tackled some very difficult agendas in order to provide relief and assistance to our business owners.

We moved here because we love the life that Portsmouth offers. The restaurants, the shops, the cultural activities, the camaraderie that normally resides in a small town, but is evident here in this wonderful city.

We purchased a condo in downtown Portsmouth, facing the Bridge Street parking lot. It has been a perfect spot for us; we can walk everywhere, and it is quiet in the evenings. We have a beautiful rooftop deck (the biggest reason for our purchase) that overlooks the Discover Portsmouth Center, has a view of the steeple on Congress Street, and is our haven to relax and enjoy our outdoor space after a long day, or on the weekends.

That being said, we supported the Bridge Street Parking lot being repurposed during COVID for the Portsmouth PopUp. We have donated to the cause, and we wholeheartedly support the concept of helping these businesses and non-profits thru this terribly impacted economy.

However, many of the neighbors in this section of town, while supporting the efforts of PopUp, do not support the concept of it becoming a Permanent Ground Lease. I read with dismay in the Portsmouth Herald that plans were under way to make this a permanent plan, and that it would be open year round except for the first few frigid months of the year.

I want to go on record as saying that because my husband and I supported this idea during such unprecedented times, does not in any way mean that we agree with having a performance space across the street from our home. The performances that have taken place, with limited seating allowed, have been so loud that there is no possible way to enjoy our deck, and in fact we can't hear anything but the performers in our indoor living spaces. This would be totally unacceptable were it to become permanent. We didn't invest in Portsmouth, both in the purchase of our home, and in choosing to offer financial support to many of the charities and non-profits here, to potentially be permanently living directly across the street from an open performance space.

Additionally, the "view" from our home has been negatively impacted. Again, we can certainly live with that on a TEMPORARY basis, because we want to be good neighbors and we want to see our Portsmouth businesses and non-profits survive.
