comments: I am unable to attend the City Council meeting on Monday Dec 21 but I wanted to express my concern regarding the Assistant Mayors discussion about the recognition of the People and History of Portsmouth's North End. Please see my comments below.

To the Mayor and City Council Members

My name is Bob Fiandaca who was born and raised in Portsmouth on the former Russell St. The homes on this street and all the homes in the entire North End neighborhood were taken from the people who lived there through a process of urban renewal in the sixties as you know. This process was devastating to my family and all the families who lived there. My grandmother, Rose Fiandaca, lived there during that time and I witnessed first hand the agony and sadness that these people endured with the taking of their homes. My grandparents immigrated to this country from Sicily in the early nineteen hundreds as was the case of many of their neighbors. They came to this country with nothing but the faith that in America they would find a new way of life that would afford them to own their own homes and raise their families. After a brief stay in Boston my grandparents found their dream home in Portsmouth at 35 Russell St. For them this was to be the place where they would raise their !

family and live out their lives. This scenario was the same for many of the people who owned homes in the north end. These hard-working people lived their lives as good American citizens, believed in God and had faith in the leaders of their government both national and local. Many including my grandmother could not understand why the City wanted to take their homes after they had always paid their taxes and followed the laws the City imposed on them.

The North End in those days was a very friendly area where everyone knew each other. There was no locking of doors and everyone respected each other. It was mainly an Italian neighborhood. These people contributed to the City of Portsmouth in many ways only to have the City devastate them by taking their homes and end a way of life and culture that was a great loss to them and to the City. These people deserve to be recognized in some way as the people who lost their homes and neighborhoods to make way for all the development that is taking place there at their expense. I implore the council to consider recognizing these people in some way in their old neighborhood as the City has previously done for other ethnic cultures in our City. Thank you and a special thanks to the Assistant Mayor Jim Splaine for pursuing this discussion and his efforts to recognize the people of the old North End neighborhood

City Councilors:

It has been two weeks since I spoke at the last city council meeting, in which time I have seen the Portsmouth community, especially my fellow PHS students, converge in our efforts against the proposed 2-year delay of the plastic ban.

As outlined in a letter to the editor of SeacoastOnline published over the weekend, a majority – 59.5% -- of surveyed area residents agreed that the ban should go forward as originally outlined, and support for the ban itself is even stronger, at 76.6% of respondents. No support has been expressed for a delay, and nor was any expressed during the public comment at the last council meeting. It is obvious that the people of this city want the anti-plastic legislation to be implemented as intended, on December 31st of this year. There has been ample time – more than twelve months – for business to prepare, and few, if any, have lodged complaints with this timeline.

One look at the data explains why so many locals are in support of the ban. We have less than a decade – approximately seven to nine years – to drastically improve our ecological behaviors. Effective waste legislation is critical now, and the need for it increases exponentially every day. Portsmouth is an eco-municipality and has been for my entire life; it is our shared duty to act in the best interest of our environment. In fact, to paraphrase the words of my science teacher, we all have a moral and ethical responsibility to treat our planet right. Tabling this issue would be a forfeiture of that responsibility, and a forfeiture of leadership. I struggle to envision a future – five, ten, or fifteen years from now – in which anybody thinks it was a good idea to sideline this legislation. Similarly, I can guarantee that, in the future, nobody will want to cough up the necessary funds to get the plastic off our shores, and out of our water, our fish, our children, and!

our soil. The financial strain of such cleanup will vastly outweigh any short-term inconvenience to local businesses.

Portsmouth alone cannot end, nor mend, the dire global plastic crisis, but can be a microcosm of the institutional action that must be taken with the utmost immediacy. With this in mind, the PHS Environmental Change Organization, including myself, again implores the council to vote in the best interest of the people of Portsmouth, and to implement the plastic ban now. Vote no.

I am writing to express my disappointment with the recent vote to delay Portsmouth's ban on single-use plastics and Styrofoam. While I understand the council's concern for small businesses, I do not see any way that delaying a decision that was originally made in October of 2019 would assist a restaurant or business in dealing with the pandemic. I'm not a restaurant owner or small business owner, but I do frequent many of those locations in our city. Most, if not all, of the businesses I patronize already use paper cups, paper bags, or other eco-friendly packaging. Delaying this ban is punishing responsible businesses, while offering very little support to help with the pandemic. Reasonable or even minimal enforcement would be a great way to avoid hurting businesses in the short-term, but delaying important and well-supported measures in our community must not be done simply to appear to be helping businesses. If businesses can provide a reasonable case that the added cost of responsible packaging will cause unrecoverable damage to their bottom line, perhaps it is right to delay; however, I doubt the cost of packaging is a serious driver of any profit margin.

The success of Portsmouth's historic (and much-needed) 2019 anti-plastic legislation was attributed, in no small part, to PHS students who backed the ordinance on ethical and scientific grounds. Youth members of the Portsmouth community understand that our actions now will directly shape our future. With this in mind, we are eager to express both our own support, and the strong support of the citizens of Portsmouth, for the immediate implementation of the disposable ban.

In a poll, 59.5% of surveyed respondents approved of the original timeline for implementation, and 76.6% of surveyed residents supported keeping the ban and looking for plastic alternatives. Similarly, in the past week, over 200 Portsmouth community members signed a petition echoing the opinion that the plastics ban should not be delayed by another two years. The citizens of Portsmouth, as well our school, have backed and prepared for this measure since last September. We ask that the Council consider the long-term effects on our residents, rather than thinking in the short term, as well as the strong support expressed by the community. Our plastic-ridden future is irreconcilable, but we as a city are poised to take effective action now, and do our part to soften the ecological blow. After all, we have been an eco-municipality for 15 years, and our leadership is charged with acting in the interest of the environment. How can we maintain that legacy if we show indifference!
on this issue?

Delaying this ban will cause a multitude of highly visible crises for Portsmouth's future. The amount of taxpayer money it will take to clean up today's plastic waste will far outweigh any temporary inconvenience to businesses, and will reflect poorly on the community, to say the least. Portsmouth and its businesses rely heavily on income from tourists. If Strawberry Banke becomes Styrofoam Banke, our economy will suffer, and so will our people.

With all of these points in mind, we urge Portsmouth's City Council to vote down the proposed delay, and to uphold the city's responsibility to its residents as a longtime eco-municipality.

comments: Response to December 17, 2020 City Manager Letter Regarding 150 Greenleaf Avenue in the December 21, 2020 City Council Packet

- The City Manager stated the case was remanded to the superior court, but neglected to mention the remand was to include past damages that were not before the jury. The original trial was for 2014-2016, (36 months) the new trial is for damages back to 2008 and likely ongoing into the future (13+years).
- The City Manager stated I have been unsuccessful in lost profit arguments, but neglects to mention the rental value is a similar number.
- The City Manager states the measure of damages is the rental value of the trespassing sewer line. In fact, the liability is not just rent for a trespassing sewer line; it is rent for almost 10 acres of developable commercial land on the route 1 bypass.
- It is not a mere allegation the City created a nuisance. The jury found the City's actions created a nuisance on my property for which the City is liable.
- The measure of damages for the eminent domain has yet to be determined by the BTLA. Even the City manager can only say she "anticipates" what the damages will be and that my request for attorneys' fees will be denied. I anticipate the City's current arguments to be as successful as all its prior arguments it has had in its ploy to prevent development of my property.
- The City is liable for the trespass and nuisance for at least 12 years on commercial developable real estate on the route 1 bypass.
- The City is liable for an illegal taking and its use of the property for 4 years.
- Damages are currently ongoing for both trespass and nuisance. What is the City planning to do to repair the land? How does the City intend to compensate me for the ongoing rent?

In regards to the botched Eminent Domain, which the Court found to be illegal and a litigation ploy:

- Is there an errors and omissions claim against Bohenko and staff?
- Does the City have a malpractice claim against Woodland, Bauer, Hodgdon and Sullivan?
- As a concerned taxpayer, I hope the City has insurance to cover the mistakes made in the illegal taking.
