comments: I'm writing to urge you to keep the bike lane on Middle Street. Portsmouth leads New Hampshire in safe cycling opportunities and is a model for other communities.

I generally bicycle from my home in Deerfield to Portsmouth weekly. Using the Rockingham Rail Trail and the bike paths and lanes in Portsmouth makes my trip safe and enjoyable.

Upon my arrival in Portsmouth, I usually spend several hours touring your city, shopping, and having lunch/dinner. Your city is a grand place to be a tourist.

Please do not take a giant step backwards in being a tourist-friendly community. While others are making financial investments in tourism, it disappoints me to see my State discarding opportunities to attract tourists. Begun in 2017, New York State now boasts a 750-mile bike trail across their State. I'll be one of the tourists riding New York's Erie Canal trail this summer and visiting their bike-friendly businesses.

Similarly, Maine will be extending its Eastern Trail this year and will be adding two bike trails spanning I-295 in the Freeport area.

I recently spent several days bicycle touring Savannah, GA. And, while doing so I kept thinking how nice it would be to have a bike-friendly community in New England. If you arrive in Savannah without a bike, you can rent one from a bike rack using a kiosk or a smartphone app. Managers in Savannah will tell you that becoming bike-friendly has increased their tourist trade while decreasing automobile congestion.

In closing, I urge you again, please let's keep moving forward. Removing the bike lane on Middle Street will cost money, decrease safety, and discourage tourism. Thank you for your consideration.

It appears to me that as our neighbouring States work to attract tourists by offering new bike paths and trails, we may be shooting ourselves in the foot.

I am writing to express my appreciation for the creation of bike lanes that currently go from PHS to downtown Portsmouth. You are all aware of the financial and safety reasons not to change the lanes that have been made clear by experts in the field. Here is a view of the meaning to families in this community.

As a resident living towards the end of Islington Street, this has allowed my family to safely access the city. One of the main reasons we moved to Portsmouth was to have access to a small city via cycling or walking. This was a HUGE draw for our family after spending significant time abroad and finding the ease and enjoyment of accessible cities. Myself growing up in New York, this was never a safe option. The joy cycling into town, to the Pierce Island Pool, library, indoor pool, farmer's market, various parks, etc. has given myself, my husband and my children is immense. Both of my children attended the Treehouse School on State Street and I was able to safely ride them in and pick them up in our cargo bike. This will remain a highlight of their early childhood.

As my children get older, they are patiently awaiting the days until they are ready themselves to ride into town. As a parent, I am looking forward to this because of the safety provided to riders in the bike lane.

You may argue that the move of bike lanes to Lincoln Street will still provide access to these same areas, of which I would agree. But I can tell you from personally taking Lincoln Street from its start by the City Hall to Middle Street (mostly to check out Halloween and Christmas decorations) it is not conducive to bike riding. The road as is, does not provide enough space for bikers to safely ride alongside with cars. There is a lot of navigating involving cars and bikers having to stop, or cars forming one-lane traffic to allow bikers to pass. In addition, the amount of stop signs greatly hinders on the ability to ride your bicycle. The constant stopping and looking for moving cars, which I myself have confused with parked cars many times on Lincoln, is a safety issue, especially if this is to be used by children going to school.

If you personally have never ridden a bicycle on the Middle Street Bike Lanes, please consider the experience of others before you consider removing them. I would also encourage you to get out of your comfort zone and give it a try. It is a whole new way to access the city and only enhances what Portsmouth already provides.

In regards to cars, the Middle Street bike lanes have only improved driver behavior on Middle Street. As mentioned before, as a former New Yorker, I struggled with following the speed limit down Middle until the bike lanes were constructed. The normal sized driving lanes that are now in place require a driver to drive slower, and therefore safer. I do not fear being "doored" by drivers on my bicycle until the bike lane ends, at which point I am forced to drive in the flow of traffic to create a buffer that the lanes so nicely provide.

I hope you have taken the time to read this message. While you may for some reason be persuaded to move against professional advice to keep the lanes as is, I hope the personal meaning of these bike lanes to the community will motivate you to think differently.

Portsmouth's FY 2022 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is not ready for prime time. Listed below are the reasons why.

1) As stated on page 11 of this this year's CIP, "The purposes of the CIP are to...Provide a complete picture of the City's major development needs". The FY 2022 CIP does not provide a complete picture of the City's major development needs.

City Hall first identified the Bartlett Street Railroad Bridge Replacement as a CIP project in 1997. It remained a CIP project for 19 consecutive years until it mysteriously disappeared in the FY 2017 CIP. Similarly, the Bartlett Street / Jewell Court Realignment project began appearing the CIP in the late 1990's and was last seen in the FY 2015-2020 CIP. This project was first recommended by City consultants in 1999 report (VHB Engineers), and again in 2005 report (Maguire Group Engineers) and lastly recommended in 2009 in a report titled "Islington Street Corridor Improvement Action Plan" prepared by Richardson & Associates. See report in link below for the report and Appendix A for the previous consultant recommendations to align Bartlett Street with Jewell Court.

2) As a planning document, it would seem the CIP's purpose is to identify needed projects and continue to list those projects every year until they are completed. Oddly, active CIP projects listed in prior years such as Peverly Hill Road Improvements, Elwyn Road Side Path and North Mill Pond Nature Trail are absent from the FY 2022 CIP. These projects need to be added back in order to "provide a complete picture"

3) The CIP needs to prioritize and fund the reconstruction of Portsmouth's two state red listed bridges, namely the Cate Street Bridge over Hodgson Brook (red listed since 1993) and the Maplewood Ave Bridge over North Mill Pond. The design plans for the Maplewood Ave bridge have been prepared since 2009 (see link below). The construction cost estimate on page 44 is \$3.8 million. This project has been delayed long enough. The plans in the link below need to be put out to bid and then constructed ASAP.

4) You will note in the cover letter to the City Council, (page 11 of 250), that City Hall claims it is only going to use \$1.48 million dollars from the budget to fund the CIP. This is money taken directly from the General Fund to pay for CIP related items. I also note City Hall plans to borrow \$41,450,000.00 to pay for other CIP items. The annual interest payments on a loan this large will be in the millions of dollars Where is that CIP expense accounted for?

## CAPITAL BUDGET (cityofportsmouth.com)

By City Hall's own admission, the FY 2022 CIP expenses only represent 1.24% of the FY 2021 budget. With such miniscule fraction of the budget in play, I see no reason to rush its approval. I urge the City Council to delay the approval of the CIP until the Council is satisfied it represents "a complete picture of the City's major development

needs."

comments: I am writing to urge the Council to reject the changes proposed by Councilors Kennedy and Huda, described in the council meeting packet for March 8, 2021.

The proposed changes fly in the face of both public safety and common sense by eliminating a significant portion of Middle Street's separated bicycle lane while costing the tax-payers over \$300k due to grant repayment and further infrastructure changes.

Toole Design's recent engineering assessment of a similar proposed change concludes that moving the bicycle lane into traffic would

"effectively reduce the [intersection sight distance] because drivers exiting driveway and side streets would need to be able to view a bicycling traveling adjacent to the on-street parking instead of only the motorist in the center of their lane like they do today."

Meanwhile, the report is clear that intersection sight distance is already marginal at numerous points along Middle Street and that any further reduction would come at the expense of user safety.

In addition to jeopardizing rider safety, the proposed changes would serve to discourage cycling in the downtown area at a time when bicycle ridership has been increasing year-by-year. Given the traffic and parking troubles which Portsmouth has long struggled with, we should be \*encouraging\*, not discouraging alternative modes of transportation.

I ask that the Council swiftly reject the proposed changes and implore Councilors Kennedy and Huda to review the recommendations of the January 2021 Toole Design report if they wish to make further proposals along these lines.

The city did an excellent job with working with transportation planners and engineers to implement this part of the Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan to design a safe route for people of all ages to bike on. While it seemed unnecessary to get outside help from Toole Design at this stage, we now have further details about how to improve the roadway. That their suggestions would only cost an additional \$1,400 to improve the safety, I see no reason to not proceed with those professional recommendations.

However, I am shocked by the counselors that continually ignore all the professionals and instead are coming up with untrained ideas of how to change the streets. The data is in – protected bike lanes not only reduce crashes for people in cars and people on bikes, but also reduce the severity of those crashes. When the fire and police departments, city planners, NHDOT, and national experts all agree that Middle St is safer with the parking-protected bike lane, there is no legitimate reason to oppose that, especially given that the grant funds spent would need to be repaid.

The thought of removing the bike lane and instead pointing toward Lincoln or other streets has no merit. People will still bike on Middle St., but without the lane they will need even more space from car doors, requiring riding further into the road for their safety. Kids will be tempted to ride on the sidewalks again, which is not only illegal, but proven more dangerous as riders are less visible past each driveway and side street. The most recent suggestion that a crosswalk would help the situation ignores that people on bikes do not use crosswalks – DMV classifies bikes as vehicles, which share the roadway.

Removal of this infrastructure is a shortsighted approach to city design, in returning the parking to the curb you are creating less than ideal roadway conditions for non-motorized transportation through this corridor. With comfort diminished, more people will be forced to seek alternate (motorized) transportation through this part of town.

There has been no indication that this infrastructure is less safe, in fact, it's proven safer than previous roadway design. Not listening to your engineers and consultants is similar to knowing that covid is out there and deadly and not wearing a mask because you don't find it convenient or comfortable.

Lastly, the fiscal responsibility of this decision to move the parking to the curb is questionable, think about the \$320,000

in wasted and returned monies that you could use elsewhere to improve city infrastructure.

comments: As you know, Councilors Kennedy and Huda are proposing modifications to the Middle Street Bike Lane from Highland Street to the intersection of Lincoln Avenue and Middle Street which consist of moving the vehicles back to the curb and relocating the bike lanes to the outside of the parked cars and next to the motor vehicle travel lane.

In her Memo to the Council, the City Manager states that the requested modification consists of 1600 linear feet or 16% of the entire project length, which means that 84% of the project as originally designed and constructed will remain unchanged. And yet, she goes on to state that Bill Watson of NHDOT claims that the entire Federal Grant will have to be refunded if this change is made. That makes absolutely no sense. Why should the entire grant need to be returned when only 16% of the project is proposed to be modified ?

In previous e-mails to you on this topic, I have maintained that the requirement to return the Federal funding must be set forth in the Code of Federal Regulations or similar paperwork and suggested that you ask Mr.Watson to produce such documentation. Have you done so and has he produced it?

I ask because in reviewing correspondence on this matter I have only seen references to Mr. Watson's conclusion, but never seen the documentation on which he bases that conclusion.

As I understand Mr. Warson and others, the reason the Federal funding must be returned is that the proposed modifications do not demonstrate safety, environmental or other concerns that would justify the redesign. However, what about TDG'S proposed bike lane alteration near Cabot Street which is designed to create a smoother transition and the creation of a Pedestrian Crossing improvement by installing an RRFB at the intersection of Middle Street and Wibird Street?Do not these modifications demonstrate safety concerns.?

In conclusion, giving Mr.Watson the benefit of the doubt, I submit if the Federal funding must be returned, the amount to be returned should be 16% of the \$223,764 or \$35,802.24, minus a credit of \$16,200, the cost of the bike lane alteration near Cabot Street plus the cost of installing the RRFB at the intersection of Middle and Wibird Streets, for a net of \$19,602.24.

Moving forward, as you consider proposals for various sporting venues, I would like you to at least consider the fact that there are many athletes that follow less traditional paths (i.e. do not play baseball, basketball, hockey, etc...). Many of the Portsmouth youth in our community are just as passionate about less traditional sports such as skateboarding, BMX, scootering, etc... yet they do not have what I consider to be a proper facility within the city. I happen to be someone that fortunately found skateboarding as a young teen and it provided the perfect combination of athleticism and artistry. Furthermore, I believe it truly kept me away from unhealthy activities as a teenager while providing a strong foundation for future athletic pursuits such as rowing in college. With the closure of the most prominent local park, Rye Airfield, the demand for alternatives to this park will only increase and likely lead to more skateboarding in downtown areas where such acti!

vities are prohibited. Currently, the Greenleaf Ave. "park" (I use that term quite loosely) designated for some of the aforementioned sports was designed very poorly using low quality prefabricated structures decades ago. I found these Greenleaf structures to be unusable and hazardous 10 years ago when I last skateboarded actively. Based on recent visual inspection, these structures seem to have just degraded further. Lastly, the location of the park on Greenleaf Ave. is not conducive to safe access by foot/skateboard for most interested residents.

In closing, I just want you to be aware that while I fully support acquiring whatever resources are deemed necessary for more traditional sports (i.e. outdoor fields, indoor basketball courts, etc...), I am strongly in favor of pursuing a venue for these less traditional yet equally important sports. I have seen proposals to remove the Middle Street bike lanes and return parking to the curb. According to safety experts hired by the city, this would make travel less safe for cyclists, pedestrians, and motorists. Also, removal of the bike lane would result in substantial cost to taxpayers, from repayment of grant money, as well as cost of reconfiguring the roadway.

This was included in January 11 City Council meeting packet:

Toole Design Group's analysis does not find that the design modifications requested by Council are merited and their independent review of the bike lanes did not demonstrate safety, environmental, or other concerns that would justify a substantial redesign. However, Toole has identified several measures that could be implemented to improve the safety and operations of the bike lanes and pedestrian traffic, while not exposing the City to possible repayment of the federal grant.

Also:

Bill Watson, Administrator at the NHDOT Bureau of Planning and Community Assistance, has provided an email as follow-up to that meeting on January 11, which also verifies that the City would be expected to pay back the federal funds should we decide to move forward with the Council's request.

The proposal to remove the bike lanes is a solution in search of a problem. Actually, it is a solution that would result in making the situation less safe for all road users, and adds cost to taxpayers.

Please do the right thing and end this nonsense.

comments: Dear City Council Members,

I am reaching out to you in regard to the school budget for 2021-2022. I have many concerns about the City Council's request for a ZERO percent increase in the school budget. As it stands currently, Steve Zadravec and the school board have presented a budget with a 2.97% increase, with contractual obligations and an increase in benefits and retirement funding primarily driving that increase. And yet it is clear that schools will need more funding next year to ensure the health and safety of our students, as well as additional support and enhanced instruction for students due to the pandemic. So many of our students have experienced disruption and distress due to the pandemic and a ZERO percent increase is not only unachievable due to contractual obligations, but also irresponsible of us to NOT support our students and schools during this difficult time.

The current proposed school budget (as presented by Steve at the Feb. 9 school board meeting) eliminates the equivalent of 7 full-time positions throughout the school system. While some are administrative and can be absorbed into other positions, others like an elementary teacher, reading and literacy specialists, and the Farm-to-School coordinator have significant impacts on our children. While Steve has presented the elimination of these positions as positions that can be "absorbed" into other existing role or positions, I am concerned that we are not redirecting those salaries and benefits into NEEDED positions to support our student population, like additional reading and math specialists, paraprofessionals, counselors to offer emotional support to students and staff, tutors, or filling new positions like a second language teacher for elementary schools. If we eliminate the funding for these positions from the budget, that could be redirected towards needed positions!

, it will take years to get these funds back into the budget.

The pandemic has only amplified our need for additional support staff, specialists, and paraprofessionals at our schools. A Department of Education report, titled the Condition of Education 2018, states the number of students aged 3 to 21 receiving special education services increased from 6.6 million to 6.7 million from the 2014-2015 school year to the 2015-2016 school year. Among those, 34 percent had specific learning disabilities, of which 20 percent had speech or language impairments and 14 percent had other health impairments.

This national trend is also playing out in our elementary schools, with Mrs. Joanne Simons, principal at New Franklin School, noting one of her biggest challenges is maintaining the number of paraprofessionals to support students with identified needs. "We are seeing our identified numbers and needs increase, and the para positions are essential in implementing IEPs and supporting our students in the classroom," states Mrs. Simons. In addition, should we be in the same position of remote learning and less in-school time next fall due to the pandemic, Mrs. Simons notes she will need an additional teacher to keep class sizes smaller due to social distancing requirements.

Removing these salaries from the proposed budget is irresponsible, knowing that we have additional needs for students that will need to be met due to the pandemic. Recent studies have shown that the cost to schools to help students "catch up" from the pandemic school year could be between \$12,000 to \$13,500 per student over the next five years. Please refer to the link below for the article.

Caught in a Financial 'Triple Squeeze,' Districts Could See Annual Costs of \$2,500 Per Student to Address Pandemic-Related Learning Loss | The 74 (the74million.org) While federal funds will help with some of the additional costs, it will not be enough. We need to keep our schools

moving forward. Budget cuts to our schools this year, impact school budgets for years to come.

I currently have a fourth and fifth-grader at New Franklin School. My fifth grader has been fortunate enough to be in school "full-time" since an opening in her grade allowed her to be there 3.5 days a week in early November. She is now in full days Monday through Thursday with the new schedule. We are extremely fortunate that she was the student that was "next" on the list to be full-time. Remote learning was a struggle for her and a battle for us. Even with our fortunate circumstances, she has lost a lot of progress we achieved last year in her reading comprehension and fluency. She has slipped dramatically in her recent DRA assessment. We know firsthand, that she will need additional support for the remainder of this year, possibly over the summer, and certainly starting up in middle school next year.

Our fourth-grader had been going in for his one day of instruction until the new schedule which brings him in for four half-day sessions. Academically, he has always excelled, but the pandemic has brought challenges for him emotionally and socially. Last spring, we noticed him become very withdrawn and recluse with remote learning. Over the summer we saw him perk up with outdoor play dates with friends, only to withdraw again this fall.

We can't let the pandemic derail our children's education and asking for a zero percent increase in the school budget will do just that. We MUST adequately fund our 2020-2021 school budget to allow for not only the contractual obligations but provide for the resources and staff that will be needed for years to come.

I know the City of Portsmouth is facing challenges as well due to the pandemic and they are not to be taken lightly. Reduced revenues coming in, means reduced spending levels. But as you look at all of the departments and the City's overall budget, I am asking you to NOT let our kids take the brunt of the pandemic. The City and community rallied this summer to help support our local restaurants and businesses, we must now rally for our students and schools. We must find additional funds to support our students and our schools. Our children are our future. Our schools attract new residents and companies to Portsmouth and keep our city growing and innovating, our emphasis on K-12 education is a big part of that.

Thank you for your service to our City and I ask you to please support our schools with an increase in school funding to appropriately meet the needs of our students.
