Comparable Sister Cities Research

How many? Up to 18

How old? As much as 56 years. But dormancy is common (often due to leadership changes)

Organizational structure: Nonprofit; Mayor's office; all volunteer, small budgets (\$3-\$45K as mentioned)

Committee structure: Organized by Sister City; membership fees (\$20-25), officers with term limits

Funding: fundraisers, raffles, small city funds, grants, membership fees

Comparable Sister Cities Research (continued)

How is relationship sustained? Business/student exchanges, cultural celebrations

Marketing: Websites, newsletters, email list, notices to local groups (eg Rotary, Kiwanis, churches, schools)

Program activities: Student, artist or business exchanges

Partnerships: Educational institutions, hotels, Chambers of Commerce, cultural groups, city government


Biggest struggle: Funding, volunteers, continuity/sustainability, getting the word out, negative perception ("junkets")

Which cities were you familiar with?







The focus of Portsmouth's Sister City program has been educational through high school exchange programs.

Summary of Public Input

- Events get people interested
- Need public education about our program history
- City exchanges have been based on historical, industry and demographics—often the reason why sister cities have stayed active
- Portsmouth needs a clearinghouse for all international activities Instead of just Portsmouth, make it Greater Portsmouth program
- Look into NHCF for support
- Consider international service learning
- Explore opportunities with the international business community who have a local presence in the region (Lonza, etc.)




Objective 1.

Make recommendations to the City Council to "potentially terminate" current relationships with little or no recent activity, resident interest or cultural/economic opportunities

Committee Recommendation:

Leave dormant relationships in place—do not terminate



Objective 2.

Make recommendations to the City Council for a program and strategies to ensure success of existing and future Sister City relationships

Recommendation 1:

Create a formal application process for establishing or reigniting existing Sister City or Friendship City connections and for proposing special citizen diplomacy projects

Proposed process

- 1. Individual citizen(s) or organizations submit an application to Sister City/Citizen Diplomacy Committee
- 2. Committee reviews and recommends to Mayor
- 3. If accepted, Mayor and applicant sign letter of agreement

Objective 2. Cont'd



Recommendation 2:

Establish a clearinghouse for existing/active citizen diplomacy programs and projects to enhance awareness, generate interest, and encourage participation.

Objective 2. Cont'd



Recommendation 3:

Regularly update the Committee's City of Portsmouth website page and Facebook group to raise awareness and encourage participation in citizen diplomacy events (maybe hold an annual event).

Objective 3.

Recommend a framework for long term administration, promotion and success of the Portsmouth Sister City Program through a Committee structure: chair, co-chairs, possible subcommittees for each Sister City, staff support requirements, etc.

Recommendation:

Establish a formal ongoing city committee "Portsmouth Sister City/Citizen Diplomacy Committee." Members serve for 2 or 3-year terms.

Objective 4.

Explore ways to engage the community in the program (business, educational, cultural and humanitarian groups) and make recommendations to the City Council.

Recommendations:

- Explore interest in creating Sister/Friendship City relationships with the home cities of international businesses with a Portsmouth/Greater Portsmouth/Seacoast office
- Encourage individual diplomacy/cross cultural exchanges through community outreach to local groups
