Below is a copy of the NH Flood Hazard Viewer for the area of the Site Walk in Prescott Park. It is in the AE Zone with EL 8. This flood map is dated 01/29/2021.

Some things to consider:

- 1. If the building(s) are raised 8' that is the absolute minimum protection for the next 9 years.
- 2. Notice how the flood zone runs. Will raising this area then impact the areas next to them which are not in the flood zone. Not all water runs where engineers think it will. The storm just a couple days ago had rain sheeting across not down. Water runs the path of least resistance and rain and snow move as the wind blows.
- 3. The goal seems to be to build a bigger stage and provide more building access for name bands.
- 4. Could the building be preserved and a much larger venue be built on Pease or other areas out of the wetlands? Wasn't Prescott Park supposed to be a quiet park for all to enjoy with small local plays and bands, not for big name bands and thousands of people with no place to go if anything happened much less any place to park?
- 5. How long will the height increase provide protection? Flood Zones are reevaluated every 10 years. Will it need to be dug up again in 15 years or less? It seems to be going from a grassy area to a lot more man made surfaces.

Tide Gates-explanation from Internet

On tidewater side of the pipe there is a hinged door which opens outwards towards the bay or estuary. When water levels are higher on the side of the pipe towards the drained area, the weight of the water holds the door open, allowing water to flow out into the bay or estuary.
