To The Portsmouth City Council -

I add my support to that of others who urge you to take the final step in the authorization of body cams for our law enforcement personnel. The Portsmouth Police Commission and the department have worked hard in recent months to make sure that the proposal before you is a can-do approach to bringing greater transparency.

I have been a long-time supporter of body and cruiser cameras for Portsmouth. It was in early 2014 that I first proposed the concept for our community, and while it has taken too long to get to this point, we are there. And we are there because of the hard work of staff and previous Police Commissions, including the one I was on with Commissioners Joe Onosko, Arthur Hilson, and Stefany Shaheen.

At that time we held a year-long discussion study with citizens and members of the police department, looking at the pros and cons of body cams. It seemed clear to me that one of the best reasons for body cams would be that our law enforcement personnel will be protected by having their own video representation of what occurs in the event of an incident. Since nearly everyone has cameras nowadays, the police will have one too.

In addition, body cams will be able to provide training of "best-practices" with real-time video representations of how to bring the highest levels of service to our citizenry. Around the nation there are examples of police doing great work that without the body cam evidence would have gone unnoticed. That can result in even greater respect by the public for the work our officers do in the field.

I would like to especially note the contributions to the cause by Police Commissioner Buzz Scherr and Police Chief Mark Newport. I'm sure they will with all other department personnel to make Portsmouth's experience with body cams work well and effectively.
