Letter Of Consensus And Citizen Compact Of The Portsmouth-Severodvinsk Connection

Sunday, July 16, 1995

Preamble: Under the auspices of the citizen group Portsmouth-Severodvinsk Connection, in June 1994 a delegation from Severodvinsk, Russia, visited Portsmouth, New Hampshire. In July 1995, a delegation from Portsmouth made a return visit to Severodvinsk. Both cities have nuclear submarine shipyards. The purpose of the visits was to discuss the common problems both cities are facing in the belief that active citizen participation in the areas of defense conversion, community development, and environmental clean-up is critical to resolving these problems. The Portsmouth-Severodvinsk Connection is Intended to encourage and expand an exchange between communities so that people may learn more about each other's cities and the lives of their citizens.

In the interest of enduring friendship and a pledge of cooperation, we sign this Letter of Consensus and Citizen Compact, signifying our commitment to work toward mutual understanding between Russians and Americans.

We recognize the importance of citizen-to-citizen relationships. When citizens meet in personal associations and discuss mutual concerns, no government can prevent them from becoming friends.

As stewards of the earth, it is the responsibility of people to protect, preserve, and conserve the earth for the future.

We share a desire for universal peace.

We will help to organize a constructive dialogue between the institutions of both cities.

We will continue the dialogue begun in June of 1994 in Portsmouth, New Hampshire, and continued in July of 1995 in Severodvinsk, Russia, to assure cooperation between our communities.

We confirm our readiness to promote further development and cooperation in the following spheres: citizen-to-citizen diplomacy, health care, environment, culture, education, defense conversion, and economic development and diversification.

Comparable Sister Cities Research

How many? Up to 18

How old? As much as 56 years. But dormancy is common (often due to leadership changes)

Organizational structure: Nonprofit; Mayor's office; all volunteer, small budgets (\$3-\$45K as mentioned)

Committee structure: Organized by Sister City; Membership fees (\$20-25), Officers with term limits

Funding: fundraisers, raffles, small city funds, grants, membership fees

Comparable Sister Cities Research (continued)

How is relationship sustained? Business/student exchanges, cultural celebrations

Marketing: websites, newsletters, email list, notices to local groups (eg Rotary, Kiwanis, churches, schools)

Program activities: student, artist or business exchanges

Partnerships: educational institutions, hotels, Chamber of Commerce, cultural groups, city

Biggest struggle: funding, volunteers, continuity/sustainability, getting the word out, negative perception ("junkets")
